A Word from the Pastor

Welcome to the month of August! It feels like much more time has gone by, since the year 2020 began than only 8 months, where we have reached the 2nd half of this year's summer!

But here we are! We find ourselves in the midst of an election year, which includes a new reality we must live with called Corona virus, or Covid - 19. This pandemic has dominated our plans and actions as a nation, as well as causing plenty of human devastation with severe illness and unfortunately, a mounting death toll.

It is also a year where all kinds of people you probably would not expect to, are rising up as allies against entrenched racial injustice, in our nation, and throughout the world!

This new reality of course, is not what we expected when the new year dawned! Yet as Christians, followers of Christ, we are also people who do not give in to despair or darkness, since we happen to be people of faith.

And the good thing about faith in the midst of these times, is its sustaining quality. Faith has a lasting endurance, because it is not based on human ingenuity. Faith does not depend on how good we are at being faithful --- never did! Faith does not depend on us, but on the God we worship!

Faith, belief, or better yet - TRUST, is not based on amounts that can be measured, like recipe ingredients, according to Jesus.

With this summer focusing on several parables of Jesus, in the gospel readings, we are reminded that Jesus told us, the kingdom of God is like a mustard seed, which begins as a very tiny seed. So it is very easy to underestimate the power of what this seed (God's kingdom) God's reign or rule, that is --- God's activity in the world ---can do! God is still shaping the world according to God's purposes, and before you know it, the tiny mustard seed of God's activity, grows into a great bush, of God-like happenings in our world!

In this way we would do well to recall, in spite of our fears, that the book of Revelation has a message for us, saying: "The kingdom of the world, has become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Messiah, and he will reign forever and ever." (Rev. 11:15) God is still working in the world, to bring about "new creation," and resurrection --- yes, even now!

And getting back to the connection with the mustard seed parable, where God's presence, God's Spirit in the world, begins as a very small seed. But that seed of God's work, can grow into the greatest bush! And the mustard bush of God's kingdom can catch people by surprise, with the *love, mercy, peace, generosity, justice, renewal, forgiveness, & eternal life, which comes only from God!*

Jesus' disciples, in a time when they are fearful, ask him to: "Increase our faith!" They say. He answers: "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mountain, jump into the sea, & it would obey you."

Or in the wonderful Eugene Peterson translation "The Message," Jesus replies: "You don't need more faith. There is no 'more' or 'less' in faith. If you have a bare kernel of faith, say the size of a poppy seed, you could say to this sycamore tree, 'Go jump in the lake,' and it would do it." (Luke 17:5-6)

Jesus is not ridiculing the faith, or the character of the disciples, or of us, as inadequate. He's saying any faith at all matters! Any faith trusting God is real and active, and believing that God cares about ALL of humanity and the created world; such faith will endure through life's challenges, in the darkness & in the light. Even here, & even now! Therefore, may our God grant us, our nation, & world, & church, the genuine faith in God, through the Holy Spirit, to see us through!

NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

Have you watched "Hamilton" yet? "The World Turned Upside Down" - it was the song played by the British at their surrender at the Battle of Yorktown, and what pretty much sums up most of our lives right now.

A lot of people think 2020 just needs a restart – a redo of sorts. It's hard to miss the news on the COVID virus – it's on the news daily and spread across social media. The hope was that it would be under control by this time, but new cases are still climbing. While there is good news in some locations – less hospitalizations and fewer deaths – other locations see just the opposite.

The death of George Floyd has also driven a wedge through the middle of our country. Regardless of your feelings on the Black Lives Matter movement, it has become glaringly obvious that our country has drawn lines, and peaceful protesting has become convoluted with rioting and violence.

Add onto that the upcoming election, which in a normal year can be a picture of finger pointing and ugliness, and a wicked storm is brewing.

Now more than ever is the time that we need to get comfortable being uncomfortable in having difficult conversations. We as a church family have an obligation to our community to love and to listen. Because in the middle of this, it seems that our society has forgotten to be a loving community. It seems that there has become an "if you're not with us, you're against us" mentality. People refuse to respectfully listen to each other's viewpoints or opinions, thinking that their view is "right" and anything opposing it is wrong." And we've become a very judgmental society. I recently interjected myself into a Facebook conversation about mask wearing. While everyone who does not wear a mask out in public doesn't have a medical reason for not wearing one, is it fair for us to judge them when we do not know their situation? Personally I don't think so, and respectfully voiced that opinion. Unfortunately, the backlash I received for that comment was less than kind. We are taught in Matthew 7:1-2 "Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you."

I feel that it's a huge problem when a 15 year old boy who grew up in Port Washington cannot get up and talk to a crowd about what it's like growing up as a child of color in a very Caucasian city, without bullying from a small amount of people in the crowd. But it's just as big of a problem when a woman in that crowd is called out as a racist because she's standing with the police and watching the BLM parade with her children to help them to learn something, but is not participating in it. I'm sad that's the society we are living in right now. I've lived in Ozaukee County for most of my life, and I believe it's not racism we are seeing, as much as a lack of education. Don't get me wrong - there are racists everywhere, and they are by no means absent here. But education is a huge struggle that needs addressing. I read a comment that protests are supposed to be "disruptive." I believe that is only partly true. They need to be instructive, and thought provoking. You cannot educate someone by just being disruptive – there needs to be teaching moments so learning can be involved. Maybe we need to listen to 1 Peter 3:8 – "Finally, all of you, be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble."

I've seen talk about this being the end of days – Armageddon. I don't think I believe that. Our world will right itself – but we need to be a part of the solution. We need to love and respect one another. We need to be kind to each other. I think we all learned the "golden rule" as children – "Do to others as you would have them do to you." Luke 6:31. I'm happy to have a conversation with anyone about any of this, and I'm committed to listening with love. Upside down won't last forever.

A Faithful Steward

Recently in our church an Internal Revenue agent stood up to give a testimony. He described how a great change had come into his life. He told about coming across the tax returns of a man who had an income of less than five thousand dollars a year, but who listed a contribution to his church of \$625.

This agent went to the young man's humble cottage and knocked on the door. When the man came to the door, the agent said he had come to talk about his tax return. He said he expected the man to squirm and tremble; but instead, the man welcomed the agent. The agent then questioned the man about his salary of less than five thousand dollars and the contribution of \$625 to his church. There was no flustering or hesitant excuse; he just looked the agent in the eye and said that it was his tithe and a small offering that he gave to the Lord. The agent asked for receipts as proof. The young man was able to produce them from the drawer where he kept his church envelopes.

The agent admitted that everything was correct, apologized, and was about to leave when the man invited him to attend his church. The agent thanked him and said, "I belong to a church already." Then the young man said, "Excuse me, sir, but somehow that possibility had not occurred to me."

As he drove away, he said the last sentence of that young man stayed in his mind: "Excuse me, sir, but somehow that possibility had not occurred to me." What did he mean? He did not understand it until the following Sunday morning when the offering plate passed before him and he dropped in his usual quarter. He couldn't help but think of that young man who worked with his hands as a day laborer and made less than five thousand dollars a year, yet he had dedicated to God a tenth and had added a love offering besides.

It is a part of my adoration, and my worship, and my praise, and my gratitude, and my thanksgiving when I come before God with an offering in my hand. And it shall be worthy. I will not give Him the leftovers, that which doth cost me nothing [2 Samuel 24:24].

There are several ways for members and nonmembers, to worship along on Sunday morning until feeling comfortable to return to the building.


The service continues to be shown on Facebook Live at 9:30 am at St. John Lutheran Church - Grafton, WI.

History will remember when the virus left And the houses opened And the people came out And hugged and kissed And started again


