A Word from the Pastor

For some, the final 2 months of the year, wind down the enjoyable autumn weather, as it transitions into the winter months. Yet this year of 2020 has been nothing if not unpredictable!

Plenty of people, I suspect, will wish this year "good riddens," as it closes. This year of the Corona - virus pandemic, and the summer of protests on behalf of racial justice, have made 2020, an anxious time, many people do not wish to see again for a long time, if ever!

And yet, we have made it this far, while many in our nation and around the world, have not been so fortunate! Particularly the virus known as Covid-19, has taken many lives around the world. In our own nation Covid has claimed as many lives as some of our major historical wars.

So the fact that we are still here, alive and breathing, and able to read (and write) a newsletter article like this, is a gift we humans too easily take for granted! Perhaps it is "normal" to under-appreciate our own, and other people's existence, until we face an existential threat like we have had to adjust to this year. The threat of losing the precious gift of life itself, or the lives of persons we care deeply about.

Which brings us to the month of Thanksgiving. While many people may not gather for a family meal this November, as people of faith, perhaps we are more aware of life as a blessing, and a gift from the God we believe in, than other folks, who are not people of faith, are aware of. At least I would hope so!

One of my favorite writers, the poet, Kentucky farmer, environmentalist, and Christian, Wendell Berry, in his essay "Is Life a Miracle?" makes the point: "That everything that exists is a divine gift, which places us in a position of extreme danger, solvable only by love for everything that exists, including our enemies."

Mr. Berry explains: To say that life is a miracle, then, is to insist upon the uniqueness and the unique value of individual creatures; it is to set creatures free from generalizations about them. Some time ago, I received a letter from New Mexico that offered the following dialogue: "How do you train horses?" "Which one do you have in mind?" I would accept that as a pretty adequate summary of my essay "Life is a miracle."

Therefore the world's creatures, and the places they inhabit, are truly unique. In our time, we are faced with a choice that defines life as a commodity and life as an unreproducible gift, as what I think is properly called a miracle.

And Wendell Berry concludes: "What is relevant is that we humans are part of a life that is possible only because all living things have it somehow in common, and we do not, we probably cannot understand how it works.

We are not superior to it, we cannot in any final sense own or control it, we cannot fully appreciate it, we cannot be grateful enough for it. It is ourselves, not our machines, who must recognize its beauty, its preciousness, and its mystery. If we don't we won't take care of it. We will destroy it."...

Thanksgiving, and the end of the year, is a time to reflect on the miraculousness of life, and the fact that we still have it ourselves as a gift! Which also leads to the December celebration, for Christians at least, of the great God of universe's entrance into the world, as a human child, miracle enough in itself. The Incarnation of our God, into life on earth, as "The Word became flesh, and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth." Or as the Peterson Bible declares it: "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood." (John 1:14a)

As the year 2020 ends, I pray that this great God of ours, will speedily bring an end to the terrible pandemic disease, named the Corona virus. And that God will bring comfort & healing to the many families that have suffered losses through all these events of this year.

As well as lead us into a new time of justice, and equality among and between the races and sexes of people all over the world, including here in America. And not to mention, may God give us a sense of the kind of stewardship needed to care for the earth, and its climate, the responsibility for which, God has placed in our hands! With the will to care for God's earth!

STEWARDSHIP

IT'S NOT all ABOUT THE MONEY!

The new approach to stewardship is not primarily about paying the congregation's bills. Instead stewardship is about how the congregation together can do God's work. It is about how the congregation can together live out God's call to love God and our neighbors. Stewardship is directly tied to discipleship. It is no longer about the congregation's need to receive, but about the giver's need to give. Stewardship is a way of life. It is not just about what is given to the congregation, but about how generous we are with all that God has entrusted to our care both inside and outside of the church walls and in our homes.

Council Notes

At the October meeting the following topics were discussed:

- We will continue in person and on line worship for the time being
- Thanksgiving services will be on line only, the evening before Thanksgiving day
- Wednesday evening Advent services will be via Facebook Live only with a short meditation service
- Christmas Eve services will be at 5:00 p.m. with people notifying the office of their wish to attend
- no services on Christmas day
- Prime Horizon was given permission to use the building 2 to 3 partial days per week for meetings and physical therapy
- the sound system update/replacement work is currently on hold due to the Covid 19 situation.



After much thought, prayer, and discussion, the church council has voted to discontinue our participation in the Family Promise program as a **host church** effective December 31, 2020. We will continue to support the program financially and with volunteers when possible.

We feel privileged to be a part of this important ministry and our volunteers have enjoyed interacting with the families and sharing in their successes. We are however, finding it increasingly difficult to cover necessary duties of being a host church, thus our decision.

Robin Fatla will continue to be the contact person at St. John when other host churches feel the need to reach out for volunteers – we'll help when and where we can.

We also pray for God to continue to bless the ministry going forward as new avenues to assist our neighbors in need are found.



Homeless and hungry Please help God Bless

In your travels, have you encountered men or women along the roadways or at traffic lights holding signs similar to this? What were your thoughts and feelings as you were stopped near them?

Did you avert your eyes? Did you feel compassion or pity for them in their situation? How about angry - not really sure if they were in need or just out to scam drivers? Did you feel any guilt?

I know there are those who say, "Don't give them any money because you don't know if they really need it or they're just going to spend it on alcohol or drugs."

This may be true, but we've been commanded by Jesus Christ to help those in need when asked. If they are indeed scamming me - it is not for me to judge - the Lord will take care of that on the last day. I'm commanded to help.

As a school bus driver in the city of Milwaukee, I encounter these brothers and sisters on a daily basis and I decided I could help them out with a "Blessing Bag".

Some years ago, I read about a congregation that distributed "Blessing Bags" - a bag holding various items that could be used by homeless brothers and sisters.

I decided this was something I could do for the folks I meet during my day - and something you could do too! I carry a bag in my school bus and

one in my car at all times - ready to help out a needy brother or sister.

I use a gallon size ziplock bag to help keep items dry and I include a pair of warm socks, a protein bar, a small bottle of water, travel size toothpaste and brush, a travel size bar of soap, washcloth, hand warmers and \$5.

Consider trying this yourself. The better you make someone else feel, the better you'll feel.

Treasurer's Update As Of September 30, 2020

The St John Lutheran Church Council would like to thank you for your generosity. Without your financial support the mission and ministry of St John would not be possible. The Council would also like to keep you, the congregation, updated on the financial situation at St John.

The <u>Unified Budget</u> supports the work of the church through education, evangelism, worship, youth programs, stewardship, public relations, utilities & property upkeep, mission support, salaries, office expenses, and insurance. These items are all included in our line-item budget.

Year-To-Date income \$ 95,650 Year-To-Date expenses \$136,406

The result is that St John currently has a deficit in our Unified Budget of \$40,756. However, we have received \$19,600 as a forgiveable loan through the Small Business Administration as part of the CARES Act due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The application form for forgiveness of this loan has been submitted, and once approved the \$19,600 will be placed into the Contingency Fund and used to help offset any deficit at the end of the year.

<u>Mission Support</u> is an important part of our Unified Budget. St John has distributed \$12,390 to the budgeted mission agencies for 2020. The total budgeted for Mission Support is \$12,650.

The <u>Contingency Fund</u> is outside of the Unified Budget, and is used as needed for unforeseen expenses and to offset any year-end differences between income and expenses in the Unified Budget. Any balance remaining at the end of the year will carryover to next year. Income to this fund comes from direct gifts (such as Thrivent member directed gifts), interest on savings accounts or CDs, and fund raising activities such as the chili and spaghetti dinners (which unfortunately have been curtailed this year).

Current amount in the fund \$35,475

The <u>Property Fund</u> supports any maintenance of the building and property that is not covered under Unified Budget expenses.

Current amount in the fund \$12,070


The <u>Memorial Fund</u> receives gifts for memorials and honoraria. Families of the deceased can make a request to the Council to use the memorials for specific purposes, or the funds can be used for other projects as voted upon by the St John Congregation.

Current amount in the fund \$145,169

At the Congregation's most recent annual meeting, it was recommended to use a significant portion of this fund for the upgrade of the sound system, for a new outdoor sign, and for a vertical lift in the education wing. These projects have been put on hold due to the circumstances of the Covid-19 pandemic.

This update does not include all funds at St John. A detailed listing of all budget expense line items and funds is posted on the bulletin board in the hallway, or you can contact the treasurer, Peter Viesselmann or any Council member.

I am so grateful for the community who came together each and every day to help make this happen.



A single mom and her three children began 2019 as guests in the Family Promise shelter program. She needed support and guidance as her oldest daughter had very low self-esteem, her middle child was diagnosed at an early age with autism, and her third child provided the sunshine and joy she needed on her most challenging days! As a single mom, she worked diligently with shelter staff to secure permanent and stable housing, apply for disability benefits for her son and learn solid parenting skills to deal with the day to day stresses of single parenthood.

In February of 2019, the family was accepted into the Rapid Re-housing program, which would provide them with rent assistance and case management services for one year. With the assistance from staff and a co-signer, she was able to secure a 3 bedroom apartment in Port Washington. She was required to pay 30% of her monthly income for rent, with Family Promise picking up the balance.

The family moved into their new home on April 1, 2019. Family Promise staff continued to meet with the family monthly to continue working on goals that had been established while in the shelter program. Her son was accepted into an in-home therapy program for his autism, the kids were able to get their health and dental care up to date, and her oldest flourished in school. She could indeed start feeling like a good mother again!




