# A Word from the Pastor

Here we are, in the heart and heat of summer! Sometimes in February and March, you start to think spring and summer will never come! But Summer has just officially begun, as of this writing. And in these early days of the season, our weather has been extremely hot, with several 90 degree plus days, and even one day at 101, for the 1<sup>st</sup> time in 10 years.

And by now we must accept the reality of climate change, brought on by human activity, and human use of sources of energy, i. e. fossil fuels that are not good for our own health or that of the planet. Climate change has made the most recent years, the hottest in recorded history, as a simple fact of our lives.

Both the U. S. military, that is the Pentagon military establishment, and National Geographic magazine, have for nearly 20 years now accepted the reality of these climate related changes. Community planners & engineers have begun to think and act, with these climate & weather related changes to our world in mind!

Dr. Matthew Sleeth, an emergency room physician, who became a convert to Christian faith, also was converted to an environmental consciousness of his own life, and the life of the world. He became an editor of "The Green Bible," a few years back, and has also written, "The Gospel According to the Earth."

In this work he writes: Isn't it fitting that the God who answers Job out of the whirlwind---who points to the stars, lightning, snow, lions, wild ox, and the hippopotamus to explain the workings of the universe---would send a Son that spoke the same way?

Then Dr. Sleeth adds: We attempt to make God as small as ourselves. We are forever endeavoring to "put God in a box." Nothing can be truer of our generation than the phenomenon of our trying to keep God indoors—in an air-conditioned building where the windows are sealed shut.

But then he comes to the major point: "Just as God uses creation to teach, Jesus, the incarnate God, uses organic language to share the gospel. "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. . . . Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit." (John 15:1, 5)

Finally, Dr. Sleeth comments on one of my favorite paintings, a Rembrandt work titled: "The Resurrected Lord Appears to Mary Magdalene." Saying: "The gardener that Mary sees is not a mere fancy or mistake of Scripture. He is the new Adam, the triumphal resurrection. When Rembrandt paints this moment, Christ is wearing the wide brim hat of the gardener while carrying a spade in his right hand."

Then he states: "If each of us can simply sacrifice our pride, then God will heal the land." With a reminder from Chronicles: "When I shut up the heavens so there is no rain. . . if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles. 7: 13-14 NIV)

Perhaps in these sometimes slower paced summer days, we may better learn the message the Gospel of our faith, and the land of God's creation, have to teach us, and come to a new consciousness of resurrection and renewal for ourselves, our neighbors, and our world! Amen --- let it be so!

Blessings on your July & August! May God come to heal us & God's own creation!

## STEWARDSHIP CORNER

This month's stewardship topic is **Stewards of Creation.** In the months of July and August, when our gardens are growing, and flowers blooming, it is timely to think about God's creation. Webster's New World College Dictionary defines creation as follows: **creation** (n) the universe and everything in it; all the world.

**Key Message:** In creation, God gave Adam and Eve dominion over the earth and all that is in it. God is the owner; we are stewards. Creation is our first stewardship. How might we steward and care for the earth so as to sustain it for future generations? Genesis 1.

### **GOD COMES DOWN TO US IN CREATION**

Stewardship begins at creation when God gave humanity dominion over all that God has made. God entrusted all of creation to our care - living creatures, plants, land, water and all that is. God has called us to care, nurture and preserve creation for future generations.

In the first chapter of Genesis, God forms humankind in God's own image and commands them "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every thing that moves upon the earth" (Genesis 1:28).

God values us enough to give us meaningful roles within God's mission - to care for creation. Having dominion is understood as care giving, not exploitation. Dominion is a concept borrowed from the realm of royalty. God makes us the royalty of creation and gives us the responsibility for caring for creation. Humans are to exercise godly care for "all things under their feet" (Psalm 8:6).

### **CREATION - OUR FIRST STEWARDSHIP**

A steward is someone who cares for someone else's property. From the beginning, humanity is not an owner, but a steward of God's creation. We are first receivers, not givers!

Psalm 24 states that "the Earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it." Humans simply hold the Earth in trust for God. We are tenants here, called to care for the creation on behalf of future generations and all species. The Bible calls us to "till and keep the garden" and names human beings as the trustees of creation. Because God created all the Earth and all of us, creation is beautiful and good and sacred. We are called by our devotion to God and our love for God's works to protect it.

### LIVING CREATION CARE

Caring for the earth is easily incorporated into our daily lives. And, as an added bonus, many of the ways we care for creation also save money!

### **Conserve Water**

- \* Turn off running water while brushing teeth, shaving, hand washing dishes, and applying soap in the shower.
- \* Use moisture retaining soil in potted plants.
- \* Install a rainwater collection system for outdoor watering needs.

### **Decrease carbon emissions.**

- \* Designate one "drive less" day each week when you walk, carpool, bike or take public transportation to your destinations.
- \* Run errands on your way to or from work or school to reduce the number of driving trips.
- \* Raise your thermostat in summer and lower it in winter by 3 or 5 degrees.
- \* Conduct an energy audit in your home or business.
- \* Green your space by planting trees, especially to shade roadways or buildings.

#### Buy local.

- \* Support local farmers or buy produce through a community supported agriculture program.
- \* Prepare meals using ingredients grown within a 100 mile radius of Grafton, as much as possible.
- \* Plant a garden or join a community garden.

## STEWARDSHIP CORNER CONTINUED

### Reduce Waste.

- \* Use reusable dishes, cups, glasses and silverware rather than disposables.
- \* Choose products with minimal packaging.
- \* Shop using reusable grocery bags.
- \* Start a club to share toys and clothing instead of buying more.

### Facilitate reuse.

- \* Host a garage sale
- \* Donate used clothing and household items in good condition to organizations such as Goodwill, Salvation Army, and Family Sharing.
- \* Save gift bags, boxes, and bows from birthday parties, Christmas, and other occasions to use again.

### Promote recycling.

- \* Recycle aluminum cans and paper.
- \* Encourage recycling at home, school, work and church.
- \* Participate in curb side recycling if available in your neighborhood.
- \* Ask local officials to implement additional recycling programs in areas where unavailable.
- \* Drop off plastic bags for recycling at most grocery stores and Family Sharing.
- \* Compost yard trimmings and food scraps.

### **CREATION CARE AT ST. JOHN**

- \* If you use or wash the reusable cups and glasses at St. John on Sunday morning, you help reduce waste. Thanks!
- \* If you plant flower gardens, you provide nutrition to bees that are critical for sustaining the human food supply. **Thanks!**
- \* If you help the St. John Garden Committee beautify the church property, you offer others an opportunity to enjoy God's creation. **Thanks!**

### Ask:

- \* How might I better care for God's Creation?
- \* How might the St. John faith community work together to sustain the earth for future generations?

### Pray:

God of all creation, in giving humans dominion over all things on earth, you make us co-workers in your creation. Thank you for the fruitful earth which produces all that we need for life. Help us all be good stewards of your creation, wisely using the resources of nature so that no one suffers from our abuse of them. Preserve the earth's bounty for generations yet to come; through Jesus Christ who came down to earth to save all of creation. Amen



### God in My Life Moment - Judy McMullin

This is part of a long poem attributed to St. Patrick:

Christ with me,
Christ before me, Christ behind me,
Christ in me,
Christ beneath me, Christ above me,
Christ on my right, Christ on my left,
Christ when I lie down, Christ when I arise,
Christ in every eye that sees me,
Christ in every ear that hears me.

If what St. Patrick wrote is true, and I believe it is, then really, every moment is a God moment.... But some do stand out more than others. Some take us completely by surprise and then some we can count on by consciously inviting God into the moment. Those who know me know that I'm not much into exercise. In fact I usually have to guilt myself into even taking a walk. However, I have found a special place to walk that makes "guilting myself" worth it.

I park in the lot on Hwy O by the Grafton outdoor swimming pool and walk over to the Interurban Trail, cross the road and start walking east across the footbridge over the Milwaukee River and head to E Cedar Creek Rd. This is the brisk walking part to get my heart rate up. My reward for taking that brisk walk? I get to return via a leisurely walk in Bratt's Woods, 17 wooded acres that are part of the Ozaukee Washington Land Trust. There is a meandering mulch path through trees and wildflowers with benches here and there to rest and contemplate. But my favorite bench, the destination of the walk, is the bench on the edge of the water. Here I sit and close my eyes. I feel the warm breeze on my face, I hear the leaves rustling and creaking of wood as the treetops sway, I hear birds singing...and I thank God for ears to hear. I open my eyes to see the gentle river current, an occasional kayaker, geese dipping their heads into the water, and some days a sandhill crane...and I thank God for eyes to see.

Life can be really hard. There's no shortage of things that break our hearts, worry us and even make us feel hopeless. But I find it absolutely amazing that in the midst of all of this, God gifts us with heavenly moments. God doesn't abandon us in our misery. God walks and sometimes sits on a bench with us. When I'm feeling God's presence I can't help but think that God is saying "It's nice to spend this time with you, Judy. I'm glad you're enjoying this."

The way everything came together made me realize that this is where God was calling me to move and to live and serve. By August 1st, all the apartments were spoken for and if I had not acted when I did, I would have been placed on a waiting list.

How did I end up at St. John? That is simple. Joanne Levenick kept inviting me to visit her church. For several weeks, I said no, I'll go with Janice and Tim to St. Joes for now, and do a little more visiting of other churches. Joanne was persistent and finally I said okay, I will go with you. Once there, she introduced me to people after the service, told me about the afternoon Bible study circle and again invited me to go with her, took me to the quilting group and introduced me. They can always use more quilters.

Anita Misun invited me to sing in the choir. In short, I became involved with several groups, was welcomed by them and decided to join.

If Joanne hadn't been persistent, I probably would have never even visited St. John. Again, God working in my life through Joanne.
