A Word from the Pastor

Given our recent snowfalls, we could almost say that the winter season is only in its infancy. Hopefully, however, it will not grow into any kind of raging power this year!

And while February is the shortest month, it can seem like it is the longest part of winter. Yet, just when we think the time is merely ordinary, God can be at work, even unseen.

Like the time two men were talking in the early 1800's, & thinking things were pretty dull in the community of Hodgenville, Kentucky. It was a February day, & the two men were saying to each other, "no, not much is happening lately." But then one man remembered, "Oh, yes, just the other day, Tom & Nancy had a little baby boy, around Pigeon Creek. They called their new son Abraham, after his grandfather. No, not much going on in the middle of winter."

That child of course was Abraham Lincoln, who became the 16th President of the United States, leading the American nation through the terrible civil war years, and into victory! But Lincoln was born in otherwise ordinary days on February 12th, 1809.

This God who meets people on the margins, the outcasts, the blind & the lame, the man with leprosy, and the crippled woman, and who heals them, even in the most ordinary days. And has come to heal and save us as well!

Our God is out to heal & save, us and the world, so we too, can be disciples and healers for someone else! Perhaps many someone else's. Because for God, it may be that there is no ordinary time, no dull days.

Instead the days belong to God ---- its all God time! And you never know just when this traveling, roaming God of ours, will show up in our lives. May God come to meet you, in these Epiphany days of February! And may your winter be blessed!


The newly elected Church Council and appointed officials were installed on Sunday, January 29th:

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

This month, my topic is **Stewardship of Time.** How many times have you come to the end of the day and said to yourself "where did this day go? I haven't done near what I planned to do today." I find this happening to me more times than I like. So, this topic is especially for my consideration as well as for you, the members of St. John.

"From birth to death marks a finite span of days in which we live, breathe and have our lives. Each moment is precious, as Psalm 90:12 makes clear. 'Teach us to count our days, that we may gain a wise heart.'

How we spend our time may be the most crucial stewardship question of all. After all, income levels and talents differ widely by individual, but everyone is given the same number of minutes and hours in a day. How we use them says a lot about our priorities and values.

When we choose to give our time to church, to neighbor, to a ministry that works for God's purposes, we are stewarding our time wisely."*

SUPER WOMAN (OR MAN)! In Proverbs 31, we read a tribute to a more-than-capable wife. This woman sounds more like a super hero than a real person! In the original Hebrew language, this poem is an alphabetical acrostic where each line begins with a successive letter in the Hebrew alphabet. We can read this passage as a picture of the ideal woman who embodies in human form the virtues of wisdom. Not only does she provide for her family's personal needs, the woman portrayed in Proverbs is a business person, making independent, wise financial decisions. She also supports the needy. Military language suggests a strong protective role. This woman personifies wisdom, and wisdom trumps mere beauty. Talk about a super mom (and a great steward of her time)! After reading the passage, what strikes you about the description of this capable woman, written more than 2,000 years ago? What themes in this proverb ring especially true today? Why?

REMEMBER THE SABBATH Before we stress over how little we accomplish when compared to the wise woman in Proverbs, we must recall God's commandment: Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do your work. But the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not work.... (Exodus 20:8-10). Time management and efficiency experts remind us that increased fatigue leads to decreased efficiency and effectiveness. When we're exhausted, we may display quick tempered, sloppy, or even dangerous behavior. God doesn't expect perfection or endless busyness from us. On the contrary, wise stewardship of our time includes finding time for rest, renewal, and joy.

PERSONAL FOCUS Over the course of a typical week, track where your time goes. At the end of the week, add up how many hours you spend doing specific activities (sleeping, cooking, studying, working, exercising, etc.) Review your time audit results and reflect inward: Do these hours match your values? How might you better use this time to love God and your neighbor? Consider pledging a percentage of your time that you plan to give over this year inside and outside of this congregation.

PRAYER: God of all times and all places, thank you for periods of refreshment and peace in the course of our busy lives. Help us use our leisure for the renewal of our bodies and minds so that our spirits may be opened to the needs of others. Give us diligence to seek you, wisdom to perceive you, and patience to wait for you. Grant us minds to meditate on you, eyes to behold you, ears to listen for your word, hearts to love, and lives to proclaim you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.**

Why should we observe Lent? This 40-day season of repentance and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday has three important purposes. Lent helps us **STOP, LOOK and LISTEN.**

We observe Lent because it tells us to **STOP** and rest awhile — and to stop sinning. Lent tells us to **LOOK** inward for an honest self-examination, to look upward to see the cross of Jesus with healing and love, and to look forward to the hope of the Resurrection. And we observe Lent because it tells us to **LISTEN** — to the voice of God, the words of Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

STOP, LOOK and LISTEN! These commands that are so crucial for travel safety are also important for our journey through Lent.


