NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

Think of Abraham and Sarah! The Savior of the world came as one of God's surprises...how He was conceived, where He was born, what He went on to become, and how He died to save us all.

I found this paragraph online on a website called tabletalkmagazine.com, and I loved how it kind of summed up God and His surprises:

"The God of the Bible is in the business of surprising His people with His plan, His care, and His future for them. We do not know entirely what the future holds. We often fail even to understand our past or present. But we do know that past, present, and future are in God's control. He is the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end <u>Revelations 22:13</u>. We should wonder what God will do next. We should always hope in His promises, even when things seem dark. St. John will be providing the dinner meals to the guests the week of March 20th. If you would be willing to help that week, please contact Robin Fatla or watch for further information and sign-up.



STEWARDSHIP CORNER - STEWARDS OF STUFF

We live in a culture that values accumulating and consuming stuff - property, clothes, furniture, cars etc. Similarly our congregation also has physical assets - property, equipment, land, etc. How might we, as individual ELCA members and as a congregation, be good stewards of the stuff we have by using it to love God and our neighbor? How might we challenge ourselves to live more simply for the sake of our neighbor?

GOD PROVIDES FOR US ABUNDANTLY

What role does stuff have in our lives? Even before birth most of us begin accumulating possessions, and the practice continues for most of us until our final days. Through the gifts of family and friends and the fruits of our labor, God abundantly blesses us with all we need and so much more.

Similarly, St. John Lutheran Church enjoys many blessings from God: property on a well-traveled road; a sanctuary with room to hold more in worship; ample room for Christian education classes, ample space to house our current ministries, host meetings for community and charitable organizations, and room to grow.

Are we, as individuals and as a congregation living as good stewards of the stuff God provides?

ARE WE TRAPPED BY CONSUMERISM?

Messages encouraging us to buy and consume more bombard us constantly. We hear radio ads, watch TV commercials, drive by billboards, get tempted by store displays, view pop up ads online, and often feel the need to "keep up with the Jones". With so many messages encouraging us to have more, more, it's easy to convince ourselves that we **need** more stuff. If we are really honest with ourselves, most of the things we accumulate fall in the **want** category, not the **need** category.

In 2008, the World Bank's Development Indicators, showed that individuals in the wealthiest 20% of countries accounted for 86% of the world's private consumption expenditures. In contrast, those living in the poorest 20% of countries spent a mere 1.3%. According to a United Nations Human Development Report Overview, "Those living in extreme poverty and deprivation are among the most vulnerable. More than 2.2 billion people are either near or living in multidimensional poverty... At the same time, nearly 80 percent of the global population lack comprehensive social protection. About 12 percent (842 million) suffer from chronic hunger, and nearly half of all workers - more than 1.5 billion -are in informal or precarious employment. Perhaps these facts should prompt us to ask:

- * What is a necessity and what is a luxury?
- * What are the impacts of our consumption on the environment? on society? On individuals?
- * How do the demands of wealthier nations and people that can afford to consume more impact poorer nations and people?
- * How might we challenge ourselves to live more simply for the sake of our neighbor near and far?

STEWARDSHIP OF ST. JOHN'S PROPERTY

The St. John property supports God's ministry in Grafton by providing ample place for individuals to worship, learn, and serve together. It serves as a collection point for the many charities that the members support, such as Mr. Bob's Under the Bridge, and various food pantries. Here the quilters group works on the many quilts that are donated to those in need. It provides space for the programs of Prime Horizon and the Women of the ELCA meet for Bible Study. Many of the programs of the Outreach team are hosted here and St. John is open to providing space for other groups as needed. Here the congregation meets weekly after church, for fellowship.

Ask: How is God calling St. John to use its property to serve God and neighbor?

... Are there other ministries that St. John could operate from our property?

Prayer: God of abundance, you pour out a large measure of earthly blessings: our table is richly furnished, our cup overflows, we live in comfort and security, and our church property can easily support your work here. Teach us to set our hearts on you and not these material blessings. Keep us from being captivated by prosperity, and grant us wisdom to use your blessings to your glory and to the service of our neighbor. We ask these things through Jesus Christ, your gift and our Savior. Amen.

The Team's purpose is to unite our congregations in a shared mission for the sake of the broader community. The Mission Team will include a synod-provided coach who will guide the group in the creation and implementation of mission "experiments" to bless the community and learn how to connect with those who don't have a church home and maybe are not even looking for one. The team will consist of 3 members from each of the 5 coalition congregations who will meet monthly.

And DID YOU KNOW...

... that there will be a modified version of Dwelling in The Word within Pr. Jim's sermon on Sunday, February 26th? Well, actually,

it may have already happened by the time you are reading this, but I want to talk about it anyway. The general consensus of the Dwelling in The Word exercise during worship on October 23rd was that people were uncomfortable with it. The Task Force along with Pr. Jim have modified it to hopefully feel more comfortable. We understand that doing something new that "we've never done before" can be a bit intimidating. As was mentioned at the Annual Meeting, the Spiritual Renewal Task Force has a 2-pronged purpose - to deepen current members' faith as well as determine what the future holds for St. John. We are working to figure out new ways of being church and hope that you will be open to trying new things. Stay tuned...




