# A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

We're moving into the heart of summer, in these warmest months! And as time moves ahead, we will be grateful (hopefully) to savor these days, once the weather turns cold!

Some consider these days down time. Which is one way to approach the summer. Yet from a Christian perspective, it is perhaps more appropriate to see July & August as days of renewal, regeneration, and/or Sabbath. We are often in need of a change from the routine, especially those needing a break from working life.

No matter who we are, we can all use times of refreshment. Even Jesus in his mission of world-saving, "went off by himself," to pray and be with his heavenly Father. He also needed rest, and sleep like the rest of us.

At least once, Jesus fell asleep in the back of the boat of his fishermen disciples, during a storm yet! To their frustration, they had a hard time waking him up ---that's tired! Rest and refreshment is a necessity for saviors, along with the rest of us! One of my favorite Gospel passages speaks of "the renewal of all things." (Matthew 19:28)

The setting is this: Peter said: "Look, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?" Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, AT THE RENEWAL OF ALL THINGS, . . . You who have followed me, will also sit on 12 thrones, judging the 12 tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses, or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields, for my name's sake, will receive a hundredfold, and will inherit eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first."

A description of the upside-down world of the Gospel, with God's priorities of last and first being reversed by the values of the kingdom of God! The main thing worth noting here is what Jesus calls: "The renewal of all things." As Jesus tells it, this is the way God deals with the creation --- human beings and the world ---RENEWAL!

Some believe God is all about destruction. Kill the bad guys! But our God is all about saving, and renewing. Just as the angel in John's vision in Revelation declares: **"See, I am making all things new."** He says this, instead of saying, "I am making all new things."

Various translations use slightly different words: In Eugene Peterson's Message Bible, Jesus says in Matthew 19, Jesus says, "I the re-creation of the world." The Complete Jewish Bible says: "In the regenerated world, when the Son of Man comes. . . ."

In the Syriac-English New Testament, Jesus says: **"You who have followed me into the new age (new world)".** Finally in the Contemporary English Bible, (CEB) the translation reads, Jesus tells the disciples, **"When everything is made new."** 

So we learn that our God of the Trinity, including the Son and the Holy Spirit, are all about renewal, re-creation, and making all things new, including us, and the world God has made! May the rest of your summer, be all about these very things!

# THOUGHTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

How do you define success? Do you think it's all about wealth, power, status? Or is it really about more than that? Success can be defined as "the achievement of your goals, dreams and aspirations. It's the realization of your potential and the ability to live a fulfilling and meaningful life." Success is really a journey – not a destination.

St. John is going through our own time of measuring our success. The face of religion itself seems to be changing. There are people who do not seem to feel they need the church, or the spiritual guidance that it provides. Some are so bold to think that they don't need God at all. Children are not provided with Christian religious instruction, instead being left to search for their faith when they're ready. But the question is this – if they are not taught about Jesus when they are small, how will they know what to look for when they're older?

So how does St. John measure its own success? Do we gauge it by how many butts occupy our pews? By how many dollars make their way to our collection plate? Is our success measured by our good reputation, or maybe our beautiful building? I'm pretty sure that we all know that there's way more to it than just that.

St. John has been a faithful congregation since 1866. Jesus is THE reason we come to worship. The Word is spoken every Sunday, and the Pastor expounds on that to provide teaching and insight. Outreach is a huge focus at St. John. From quilting to food drives to catastrophic donations – we are always benevolent with our time and our giving. St. John has a mission, and we take it very seriously. We 1) Proclaim the Gospel in worship and daily life, 2) Study and teach God's Word, 3) Fellowship among people of this congregation, and 4) Serve people in our surrounding community. We definitely have measureable success.

In our expanded collaboration with our fellow EPIC (ELCA Partners in Christ) churches, we are striving to take the time to be successful churches – to listen to not only what the people in our congregations need, but we are reaching out and listening to the community. What are the needs of the community, and how can the EPIC churches provide for those needs?

As the face of religion goes through changes, we, the church, need to be ready to change along with it. It may not always be church as we are used to. It may feel a little different, but change doesn't need to be bad. It can be exciting, scary, humbling, frustrating – lots of emotions and feelings all wrapped up together. But the church has gone through many changes over the years. And as we all know – the church is still here, and it's still doing amazing things.

There's no quick, miracle fix. But let's not measure our success by our numbers. I found this quote online from John Finkelde, and it's very true, "Churches are like T-shirts, we need all sizes." Churches of all sizes have a place and a role to fill in Christ's Kingdom – the big ones and the small ones.

Let's trust God, trust each other, and continue to be the people of St. John. Following our mission, and being relevant and successful in as many ways and for as long as we can.

"Blessed are those who trust in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit." Jeremiah 17:7-8

### Stewardship Corner

This month, I would like to revisit the topic of time and how we use it. I received a call this morning from a friend in England. She was calling to say "good-bye" and thank me for our friendship, ever since we met on a cruise to Alaska. My friend is dying of liver cancer and has been told that she has weeks left to live, not months or years.

We are all aware that we won't live forever, but as our days go by, we tend to forget and live as though we have all the time in the world, when the truth is, we don't know how much time we have left on this earth. My friend's call was a "wakeup call" for me.

Since the start of summer, when our normal activities are on hold for a few months, I have tended to fritter away a lot of time, instead of using it productively. I know that God doesn't expect perfection or endless busyness from us and that wise stewardship of our time includes finding time for rest, renewal and joy, but my use of time has become out of balance. It is time for me to refocus and be more deliberate in planning my days and working my plan. Getting back to a regular schedule that insures adequate sleep at night, so that I can use my days in a way that reflects my values, that allows time for me to love God and my neighbor. that allows for time to call and visit with friends in need of a visit, write that letter that lets a friend know that they are in my thoughts, take time for personal devotions. There is a fine balance that allows for flexibility and yet purposeful living.

My friend is using the weeks she has left to put her affairs in order and to contact friends in her life to thank them for friendship and what they have meant to her. It also gives her friends a chance to tell her what she has meant to them Often we forget to do this with our friends, while we can. Another friend died while I was on my recent trip to Iceland and Sweden, and I never did get to tell her what her friendship meant to me. It may seem a little thing, but in the future I will try to let my friends know how they enrich my life, before it is too late. This also includes family members, who are perhaps our best friends.

### The Stewardship of Time

I wrote to my friend today, to tell her what her friendship has meant to me and to thank her for it. I didn't get to adequately express this to her on the phone. There are others that I need to write to in the coming days, friends I need to call, and friends I see every day that should be told what their friendship means to me. I pray that God will keep me aware and move me to do this.

Prayer: God of all times and places, help us to use our times of relaxation and refreshment for the renewal of our bodies, minds and spirits. Help us to express our appreciation to friends and family, for how they enrich our lives and what they mean to us. Help us to find balance in our lives that we not neglect to study your word. Increase our love for you and others. May our lives proclaim you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
