A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

Is it true for you that October is the most gorgeous month of the year? So many colors, in a state like Wisconsin, with all of our beautiful trees, which, as has been said, trees are "the lungs of the earth." If there were no trees, would there even be people at all? Or other living creatures who make our lives enjoyable! October, as we experience it in nature, can make us simply glad to be alive and breathing!

We are also reminded as we move into autumn, that nature itself makes preparation for the colder weather! Our God has implanted into the natural world, a kind of intuition for adapting to changing conditions. So the birds, squirrels, possums and wild turkeys also have to get ready to live and survive over the winter months, if conditions don't become too unbearable!

One cold Sunday afternoon some years ago, I was driving to attend a choir Christmas concert at the local high school. The day was so cold, I wondered how even the animals could survive in such bleak weather that day? Just as I was thinking these thoughts, on the roadway I saw a large hawk spread its wings and fly majestically over the highway, just above the telephone poles, looking for a perch to sit on, and there was my answer! Yes, God takes care of God's own creatures and the world God has made; giving the beings the ability to make it through prosperous as well as difficult times.

As church, the "body of Christ" in the world we are called and given the tools we need to care for God's world, the people, and the creation itself, as well. The major gift we are given is the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of our God, to read the signs of the times, and to listen and look for where God is revealing to us what needs to be done!

The great Presbyterian Christian writer Frederick Buechner wrote in one of his sermons that, we followers of Christ, "should go with our lives where we most need to go, and where we are most needed." I believe he was talking about our individual lives, and our callings.

Yet I believe the same thing applies to us as "church" too! Where, with our church, and our churches, as congregations do we most need to go, and where are we most needed"?

This discernment is a process of discovery certainly, of who God is intending for us to become, and what our Great Creator God intends for us to do.

I believe in these times, as well, that our God means for us to join forces as church, and to work together where we can, for the good, not just of the church, and our own churches, but of the communities we have been place in, Cedarburg, Grafton, Mequon, Thiensville, etc.

Such good and cooperative work is being seen in our EPIC coalition, confirmation program, where we now have 20, count them, yes 20 students in the classes, from 5 congregations, working together, learning the faith!

These are the kinds of signs that bring hope to people, reminding us that none of us, individuals, or congregations, are in this God intended work by and for ourselves. Yes, we each have our "own" churches, with particular and specific needs. However, during these post-covid (for the most part) days, when many people feel more isolated, and lonely, being and growing to become the church God wants to be, we can be HOPE-BRINGERS, who fill a need probably no other entity can, in our towns!

So may our God help us, collectively, as we re-define church for our time, and individually, "go where we most need to go, and where we are most needed"!

THOUGHTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

What Gives You Hope? I hope you were able to take a couple minutes and include your answer on the board in Fellowship Hall. This was an exercise from the EPIC (ELCA Partners in Christ) Listening Team, and it was shared across all five EPIC churches – St. John, Immanuel, Faith, Advent and Trinity. The question was also asked at Strawberry Festival by people from Advent as they parked cars for the event, and also at our combined worship service in the park. Below is a very nice visual aid to show you how the results were calculated.



We received over 200 responses to the question. Thank you to Tom Sear and Al Gresch from Faith for finding such an intuitive way to see the results. Looking at the picture, the bigger the word in the picture, the more times it was expressed as what gave hope to someone. As you can see, family, friends, children...RELATIONSHIPS! Those are some of the top items that our church family sees as things that give them hope.

So what do we do now with this information? That is the magic question, with no magic answer. We need to put some serious thought to it, and together with our EPIC partners, figure out how to reach out to families to create stronger relationships between them and the church.

We have had interesting conversations at our EPIC meetings. One of the biggest takes was that after our combined Lenten services, people across the EPIC churches have come to see a different definition of "church family." We see that it extends outside of our walls, and includes all of the people who gather together, regardless of the congregation you belong to. We are THE church, and we need to find a way to include and provide not only for each other, but for the people who need the church but are still not sure how to find it, or see how it can fit into their lives. There is still lots of work to be done, and I'm excited to be a part of it!

OCTOBER STEWARDSHIP CORNER

STEWARDS OF GLOBAL COMMUNITIES

Last month, I wrote about our stewardship in regards to **local communities**. This month, will be about stewards of **global communities**. That portion of our budget, and additional gifts that we make in response to natural disasters that occur without warning and are not a part of our budget.

As mentioned last month, that part of our giving that goes to the synod and national church makes a difference in the global community. It enables our church (the ELCA) to respond to disasters that occur, as well as the needs of the global community, in addition to paying the salaries of those who work at the synodical and national level, keeping the lights on and the church functioning.

In addition to the general funds that are sent to the national church, several funds have been set up that we may choose to support. They are: ELCA World Hunger, Lutheran Disaster Response, Global Mission, Missionaries, Young Adults in Global Mission, International Women Leaders, and the ELCA Fund for Leaders. The following information is taken from Boundless - Stories of Christ's Abounding Love and Grace 2022 in Review:

Lutheran Disaster Response was at work in 42 countries around the world and 26 states and territories in the U. S. and the Caribbean, responding to hurricanes, tornadoes, conflict and migration, the Russia-Ukraine war and more.

ELCA World Hunger awarded 436 grants to partners in 67 countries and 57 ELCA synods. In total, over 3.3 million people were served through ELCA World Hunger partnerships worldwide.

New ELCA congregations are taking shape throughout the United States and the Caribbean and in nearly every synod, with 322 "new starts" currently in development and 33 begun during 2022. More than 70% of total new starts are in ethnically diverse communities and reflect growing diversity in their LGBTQIA+ leadership as well as their younger leaders and participants.

Fund for Leaders provided nearly \$3.5 million in scholarship assistance to 375 seminary students during the 2022-2023 academic year.

In June 2022 the International Women Leaders program celebrated its fourth full class of five scholars graduating from ELCA colleges and universities.

In 2022 131 long-term missionaries were at work in 45 countries around the world and 24 YAGM volunteers served in four country programs.



Sprinkle and split


A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.



What you need:

- Shallow dish
- Water
- Black ground pepper
- Toothpick
- Dish soap
- Bible

What you do:



- 2. Sprinkle pepper on the water.
- 3. Dab the toothpick into a drop of soap. Then touch its tip to the center of the water and observe.
- 4. Read Psalm 103:8-12. How does this experiment illustrate God's forgiveness?
- 5. Explain the science behind this experiment: The soap disturbs the water's surface tension. The soap molecules don't want to interact with the water. This repels the water molecules from the soap, causing the floating pepper to also move to the sides.

Treasurer's Update As Of August 31, 2023

The St John Lutheran Church Council would like to thank you for your generosity. Without your financial support, the mission and ministry of St John would not be possible. The Council would also like to keep you updated on the financial situation at St John.

The <u>Unified Budget</u> supports the work of the church through education, evangelism, worship, youth programs, stewardship, public relations, utilities & property upkeep, mission support, salaries, office expenses, and insurance. These items are all included in our line-item budget.

Year-To-Date income

\$ 75,805

Year-To-Date expenses

\$111,540 (including \$12,920 for Mission Support)

The result is that St John currently has a deficit in our Unified Budget of \$35,735. (Compared to a deficit of \$19,600 at this point last year.) Please prayerfully consider your support of the ongoing mission of St John Church as we move forward in the year.

<u>Mission Support</u> is an important part of our Unified Budget. St John has distributed \$12,920 to the budgeted mission agencies for 2023 including the ELCA, Lutheran Social Services, five mission partners, and six local community agencies.

The <u>Contingency Fund</u> is outside of the Unified Budget, and is used as needed for unforeseen expenses and to offset any year-end differences between income and expenses in the Unified Budget. Any balance remaining at the end of the year will carryover to next year. Income to this fund comes from direct gifts (such as Thrivent member directed gifts), interest on savings accounts or CDs, building and utility expense sharing from Prime Horizon, and fund raising activities such as the chili dinner.

Current amount in the fund \$24,950

The <u>Property Fund</u> supports any extraordinary maintenance of the building and property that is not covered under Unified Budget expenses.

Current amount in the fund \$12,590

The <u>Memorial Fund</u> receives gifts for memorials and honoraria. Families of the deceased can make a request to the Council to use the memorials for specific purposes, or the funds can be used for other projects as voted upon by the St John Congregation.

Current amount in the fund \$134.890

This year's receipts to the fund include memorials for Walt Thompson, Sue Travis, Harold Immekus, and Marian Carraway.

The most recent distribution from this fund was for the upgrade to the sound system.

This update does not include all funds at St John. A detailed listing of all budget expense line items and funds is posted on the bulletin board in the hallway, or you can contact the treasurer Peter Viesselmann, or any Council member.
