But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you the power to get wealth, so he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors as he is doing today."

The reading is about keeping proper perspective, realizing we indeed, cannot do everything for ourselves, but we need the help of other people, and the help of God, as we have been taught to "Love God, and love your neighbor as yourself."

This fact, in turn helps us live our lives, being thankful to God for unexpected, undeserved and unearned blessings. In short, a reminder that we live by grace, more than we ever know.

May our God grant to us, to live in the mentality, and the spirit of gratitude, not complaint, as we move into these coming colder days of approaching winter!

THOUGHTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

Thankful, Thanksgiving, Giving Thanks...that's what comes to my mind as Fall begins and we get ready to welcome November!

The Bible ties a lot of meaning to the concept of being thankful. To most of us, thanksgiving is an expression of gratitude. From little on, we teach our kids that "please" and "thank you" are the magic words to generally get what they want. In the end, "thanks!" becomes a word that we use a lot, but if it comes out of our mouths just out of habit, do we really mean it every time we say it? Or does it just become an automatic response? Something to ponder.

For many of us, the Thanksgiving holiday is a time to gather with our family and friends, share a big meal, maybe watch some football. Thanksgiving can be seen as a holiday of reflection. It can be a day to acknowledge all the many blessings in our lives. But what does the Bible say about thanksgiving? For one, it teaches us the important lesson that every day should be a day of thanksgiving!

The Bible provides many examples of the essential role that thankfulness has in our Christian life, no matter the circumstance. Giving thanks shouldn't be limited to a single day, but it should be a daily practice that centers our minds on God's many blessings. We should be thankful because God is worthy of our thanksgiving. Expressing thankfulness helps us remember that God is in control. It reminds us of the bigger picture – that we belong to God and that we have been blessed with every spiritual blessing.

Paul reminds us in 1 Thessalonians 16-18 that we can be thankful in all circumstances, good or bad. He writes: "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." Paul lived through terribly difficult times, and he still said, "give thanks in all circumstances." Even during hard times, or if we have unanswered prayers, having a thankful heart can turn our worries and sadness to praise. The more we make room for giving thanks, the less room there is for the bad. This doesn't mean we need to be thankful for the bad situation, but we can learn to be thankful in the midst of it. Thankfulness is a position of the heart, and we can choose this always, no matter what we are going through.

I found this very thoughtful paragraph about the meaning of thanksgiving on glorify-app.com:

"Thanksgiving illuminates what has been right there in front of us all along. It arms us against depression, illness and low self-esteem, and it fills our minds with positive thoughts so there is less room for the bad. Therefore, it's not about pretending bad things aren't happening, but rather, it is making a choice to hold on to what is good. Remember, whatever we have or do not have, we always have a choice to be thankful."

What are you thankful for? Take some time and reflect on the ways God has blessed you today!

"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever." Psalm 136:1

Fun for Kids & Grandkids



Handicrafts can spark appreciation for simple items. Weave this basket as a gift.



What you need:

- Paper plate
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Yarn (different colors)

What you do:

- In the center of the plate, trace something round. Draw 9 lines (evenly spaced) from the circle to the plate's edge.
- Cut along each line, stopping at the center circle. Trim more of the plate off so the cuts make a gradual V shape.
- Fold the plate's sides upward to form basket sides. Keep these upright as you weave a bowl-shaped basket.
- Begin weaving a length of yarn at the circle's base. Hold the end of the yarn in place as you spread the length over and under each side of the plate.
- Switch colors to make a pattern. Keep the yarn tight as you weave up the sides.
- To finish, bend down any remaining paper. Leave a tail of yarn and tuck it under a woven portion. Share your craft with a friend!

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

November is here, the month in which we exam our giving and decide what it will be for the coming year.

During the past year, I have written about the many facets of stewardship and the fact that being a good steward of God's gifts encompasses more than what we give to the church and charities.

I will be quoting from an article in the June 2015 Gather, written by the Reverend Catherine Malotky, on the subject of tithing and first fruits giving.

Reverend Malotky says that "first fruits giving assumes that we make a decision about how much to give first and then build a financial life around it." This is a new concept for me, even tho I've heard the term 'first fruits' for years. I thought that it meant setting aside my pledge to church, before paying my other expenses. She says that "first fruits is not an amount owed, but a voluntary gift offered. A spiritual discipline such as tithing is a way to demonstrate our love for God." "We cannot tithe our way into a seat at the heavenly banquet, a place has already been set for us. From that place of grace, we can open our eyes to the abundance around us, and, in thanks, share the wealth, whether it's money, wisdom, or compassion."

Many think that attaining a 10 percent tithe is not possible. She believes it is. "Our priorities might have created a financial life that crowds out giving. We have plenty to buy, including things we really need, and that can overwhelm us."

Rev. Malotky goes on to say: "One of the beauties of tithing is that it requires us to ask the question. 'How much do I need?' If I choose to give away 10 percent of my income (or more!), what kind of adjustments must I make to my day-to-day spending plan to make this possible? It goes beyond cutting out the expensive daily coffee. It might mean fewer clothing purchases, living with that old TV a while longer, or not retiring as early. For some, meeting a goal to tithe will mean way of life adjustments.

It is possible to give too much. In our economic system, giving to the point of being dependent on others is not a gift to the creation God calls us to steward. We need to ask the question, 'How much do I need?' and answer it realistically after some soul searching and math. Not all of us bring in paychecks on a regular basis. How do we determine what constitutes our income so that we might calculate our tithe?

This is tricky. Do you choose to tithe by what you make or what you put in the bank after deductions? Do you count gifts to family as part of the tithe or not? Is wealth different than income? How much should go to the congregation or church body? How much to worthy secular causes? We know the church is no longer the only provider of services to those in need.

Struggling to decide? Choose *something*. Lean into the discipline of giving and see what happens to your heart and to your awareness of God at work in the world. You will be changed!"

May this be so for each of us as we consider our support for St. John and charities in the coming year.

Treasurer's Update As Of September 30, 2023

The St John Lutheran Church Council would like to thank you for your generosity. Without your financial support, the mission and ministry of St John would not be possible. The Council would also like to keep you updated on the financial situation at St John.

The <u>Unified Budget</u> supports the work of the church through education, evangelism, worship, youth programs, stewardship, public relations, utilities & property upkeep, mission support, salaries, office expenses, and insurance. These items are all included in our line-item budget.

Year-To-Date income \$ 84,540

Year-To-Date expenses \$121,540 (including \$12,920 for Mission Support)

The result is that St John currently has a deficit in our Unified Budget of \$37,000. We do have \$25,000 in the contingency fund as shown below to help cover any year-end deficits, but we don't want to deplete that fund. Please prayerfully consider your support of the ongoing mission of St John Church as we move forward in the year.

<u>Mission Support</u> is an important part of our Unified Budget. St John has distributed \$12,920 to the budgeted mission agencies for 2023 including the ELCA, Lutheran Social Services, five mission partners, and six local community agencies.

The <u>Contingency Fund</u> is outside of the Unified Budget, and is used as needed for unforeseen expenses and to offset any year-end differences between income and expenses in the Unified Budget. Any balance remaining at the end of the year will carryover to next year. Income to this fund comes from direct gifts (such as Thrivent member directed gifts), interest on savings accounts or CDs, building and utility expense sharing from Prime Horizon, and fund raising activities such as the chili dinner.

Current amount in the fund \$24,960

The <u>Property Fund</u> supports any extraordinary maintenance of the building and property that is not covered under Unified Budget expenses.

Current amount in the fund \$12,590

The <u>Memorial Fund</u> receives gifts for memorials and honoraria. Families of the deceased can make a request to the Council to use the memorials for specific purposes, or the funds can be used for other projects as voted upon by the St John Congregation.

Current amount in the fund \$134,890

This year's receipts to the fund include memorials for Walt Thompson, Sue Travis, Harold Immekus, and Marian Carraway.

The most recent distribution from this fund was for the upgrade to the sound system.

This update does not include all funds at St John. A detailed listing of all budget expense line items and funds is posted on the bulletin board in the hallway, or you can contact the treasurer Peter Viesselmann, or any Council member.
