A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

Here we are once again at the beginning of a new year, and the end of the old one. We find ourselves already a generation into the 21st century. It's rather amazing to think that our younger people have only known life since the 2000's and not before, while elders are approaching a century of life!

If you have read our council president Sandy Allen's article in this newsletter you already know, I have indicated I will be retiring from the ministry at St. John in 2024.

After a conversation with our synod Bishop Paul Erickson last November, he advised that summer is a good time to retire. So it looks like I will be doing so on or about July 1st of the coming year.

Pastors are among those fortunate enough to have a pension through the ELCA to draw on. It is a matter of deciding on how much to live on each month, & like many of us, estimating how long our resources and health will remain in good shape.

Pastors can retire, and un-retire as well, to continue working as possible interim pastors, knowing you will be called for a specific shorter period of time, such as 18 months to 2 years of work.

St. John congregation will also be going through those changes in the coming year. I have already given the council permission to move ahead with the process of connecting with the Greater Milwaukee Synod (ELCA) to take appropriate planning steps, such as beginning a required congregational self-study, & arranging for interim work when I leave.

Bishop Erickson indicated that announcing your plans to retire a year in advance is probably too long of a time period, while just a couple of months, or a few weeks notice, is probably too short of a time for a congregation to plan ahead.

Unlike in the business world, where employees are fortunate to get or give 2- weeks notice, of an employment change, a congregation is different. Given all the changes since the covid-19 pandemic of 2020-22, and before, a congregation is still a home base where God's mission is carried out among the people, God's body in the world!

The future for St. John will not look exactly like the past, though some of the basics of church life will continue: worship, cooperative confirmation, communion, leadership planning, visitation counseling, Bible study, leadership planning, funerals, baptisms, etc. These things will continue, simply under different pastoral leadership. We can't say what the longer term future holds for the church, at present, and yet we remain people of hope and trust in God to see us through!

And starting next summer, Prime Horizon's work with St. John will be expanding, from their once a week cooking class, as they hope to utilize St. John as a campus for teaching & serving persons with developmental disabilities, teaching them necessary life-skills. The vision for this mission is very promising indeed!

This work will be a great blessing to our St. John congregation, as we serve the community in new ways into the foreseeable future! Mission work like this also provides a continuity with our 20 plus year relationship with Luther Manor, which ended in 2018.

Some of our local congregations are certainly undergoing changes in pastoral leadership: Grace – Grafton, has new Pastor Chris Thomas, while Trinity, recently called Pastor Erin Coutts in 2023, to serve there. And Advent – Cedarburg has had Pastor Alexis Twito now for 3 years.

We will also build on the strength of what is now called our EPIC (ELCA partners in Christ) cooperating relationships with our sister churches in Cedarburg, & possibly beyond.

The signs of ministry and mission in our area are very encouraging and hopeful! Churches that serve the community, are those that will remain sustainable as vital congregations in the long term! In our hope in Christ St. John is one of those churches!

Details are of course, to be worked out in the near future! In the meantime it has been a great pleasure to serve the faithful folks, who follow Christ, as disciples in the St. John Grafton and Lakefield area, for nearly 15 years! God has blessed St. John faith community over the past 150 plus years. My prayer is that God will continue to do so, and to show the way, into the future our God has in mind for us. May we follow where God is leading in Christ, by the help of the Holy Spirit! Peace! *Pastor Jim*

THOUGHTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome 2024! My mom always used to tell me that the older she got, the quicker the years went by. And wow was she right!

It looks like 2024 is going to bring changes for St. John! Some of them will just slide in under the radar, and not make many waves. But some of them will be big! While some of us will find these changes to be new and exciting, for others of us, the changes may feel scary and unpredictable, and make us feel nervous and unsure of our next steps. Regardless of how you view change, one of God's primary objectives in our lives is for us to change – for the better, even if our circumstances don't. He is way more interested in our hearts, and if we put our trust in Him, He will correct and shape us with His love.

Some of you may have heard that after long consideration, Pastor Jim will be retiring some time in 2024. He has not set a formal date yet, but will be discussing this with the congregation at our annual meeting. His

retirement will bring with it a litany of questions on how St. John will go forward in calling a new pastor. My request to you is that before our annual meeting, please prayerfully think about your feelings about a new pastor. It's no secret that we have struggled to meet our budget over the last few years. We always seem to spend more money than we take in, and have been forced to use money from our contingency fund to balance. By calling a half time or three quarter time pastor instead of a full time pastor, we would be able to cut some money from our budget. But the calling of a pastor cannot be based on money alone. We need to identify our needs. I am proud of the people of St. John – you are a very strong congregation, and lead this congregation well. So what do we want our new pastor to handle? Leading worship every Sunday is a given. But what other items are non-negotiable and necessary? Please come to the annual meeting with your thoughts and ideas.

We have been in discussions with Prime Horizon about broadening their use of our building in 2024. They provided a tentative proposal in November to utilize our building as a campus for a Life Skills Day Program for individuals with intellectual developmental disabilities, to focus on personal finance, job skills, resiliency, independent living and communications skills. Some of you know that they already host a cooking class at St. John weekly, and a part of expanding this would include them planting a small vegetable garden on site. We are very excited about this further partnership with Prime Horizon and hope for the support of the congregation.

It was sad news that after a long partnership with Groth Country Gardens they announced that they would no longer be providing flower arrangements for churches after the end of 2023. This will open up different opportunities for our congregation members. If you're a flower arranger, please feel free to design your own. If not, bouquets are readily available for sale all over the place – grocery stores, Walmart, and we have vases available to use. Maybe you have beautiful flowers growing in your garden that you'd like to share! We will ask the congregation to sign up and bring their flowers for Sunday morning. And if no one signs up – well it's kind of like treats. And we all know how that works.

Changes can be difficult, but they are inevitable. There will always be changes and we cannot avoid the fact that we will encounter change throughout our lives - some good, some not so good. I will put my trust in God, and I hope you will join me. God is aware of every change and circumstance, and we need to trust Him with the outcome of the changes in our lives. Whatever we need, He will provide, whatever we lose, He will restore in His own way. Blessings to all of you for a New Year filled with health, peace, prosperity and love!

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Happy New Year!! Have you made your resolutions yet as to how you are going to improve yourself and your use of time in the coming year? No? Neither have I. But really, what are these resolutions, other than how are we going to be better stewards of the time that God has given us? Something that we should work at every day of our lives.

I recently read a book that raises a lot of questions for the reader. It is called "The Measure" written by Nikki Erlick. "It begins with what seems like an ordinary day, except that everyone in the world, 22 or older, receives a little wooden box outside their door. Inscribed on each box was the cryptic message written in the native tongue of its recipient: *"The measure of your life lies within."*

Within each box was a single string, initially hidden by a silvery white piece of delicate fabric, so even those who lifted the lid would think twice before looking at what lay underneath." Each individual had to decide for him/herself whether or not to look and see how long they would live.

The strings caused many problems: if your insurer knew you had a short string, would they deny coverage for tests etc. that the person thought would be covered? Would a bank deny a loan to a short stringer? Would a "short stringer" open fire in a mall or hospital, because he was going to die anyway? Some sold what they had and took the trip they always wanted, etc. Some had trouble dealing with the knowledge they would soon die.

"Long stringers" took risks that they would not normally take, because they knew they wouldn't die. The army wanted only "long stringers" because they wouldn't be killed, maybe maimed for life, but not killed.

"Long stringers" would know that an experimental treatment would work because it wasn't their time to die. The list goes on.

Eventually the two groups began to fear each other and to act against each other in various ways. It divided the country. A third group decided not to look in their boxes, but continued to live as we have always lived. But they, too, had to make decisions such as do I marry a short stringer? Have children with him/her knowing they would not see them grow to adulthood? Obviously, there were many more ramifications.

As Christians we are told to live as if each day is our last. In other words, to be good stewards of our time, to use it for the good of others etc. So if you were to receive a box with a string in it, would you open it? Would you want to know the length of your life? If you opened it and it was a short string, would it change the way you live your life? Questions to ponder. I recommend the book to you. It is a good read. Sharlene Sandquíst


